CHAPTER IV

CONCLUSION

Started from questioning on how IAI Work Plan II improves human development of CLMV in order to achieve Competitive Market Region, the writer has reached its conclusion regarding this paper. With the paper's objective to examine how IAI Work Plan II could be exercised to improve the development of CLMV and Competitiveness, the writer had done examination role of ASEAN, process of establishment of IAI and potential output of CLMV human development points through proposed IAI Work Plan II. The writer concludes that IAI Work Plan could benefit for human development of CLMV. However, IAI Work Plan II is not enough to increase competitiveness within ASEAN members. To understand such conclusion, the writer would briefly construct the process of examination and provides new findings related to the research.

The writer had examined the role of ASEAN in particular as arena which means that ASEAN shall independently act to improve the development of CLMV. ASEAN had agreed to launch IAI by 2000 through the Fourth ASEAN Informal Summit. Hanoi Declaration on Narrowing Development Gap for Close ASEAN Integration 2001 recognized the urgency to accelerate development of CLMV. In 2003, IAI Work Plan I established as well as the ASEAN Economic Community blue print. Furthermore, the ASEAN Charter article 6 mentioned "Alleviate poverty and

narrow development gap within ASEAN through Mutual Assistance and Cooperation" means that ASEAN has many documents that force them to narrow the development gap —or in this thesis' focus point is to improve the development of CLMV. Related to ASEAN Economic Community pillar, ASEAN also shall undertake to improve the competitiveness within ASEAN to achieve Competitive Market Region. Afterwards, ASEAN made much of documents related to improving development of CLMV from 2002-2008.

This lot of output made by ASEAN is one of the results of how ASEAN could maintain the harmony between member states. The writer found that ASEAN as arena could maintain conducive relations within ASEAN. However, in the other side, ASEAN poorly exercise its mandate to enforce the implementation of mentioned documents by member states. The non-interference principle quite hampers ASEAN to act as actor to enact development policies yet it supports ASEAN as actor to maintain the relations within member states. Albeit so, ASEAN launched IAI as mean to improve the development of CLMV in concrete way.

The IAI Work Plan I ended by 2008, yet there were some projects that still on going. Until October 2009, 84% of IAI Work Plan I projects were completed. Afterwards, ASEAN expanded the IAI into IAI Work Plan II. Through new monitoring system on IAI Work Plan II, aforementioned Work Plan shall be exercised towards better result.

The IAI Work Plan II had improved the human development of CLMV. The writer did examination on which indicator –indicators of Human Development Indexthat significantly improved and relevant to projects that were proposed. Those findings also examined each CLMV countries advantage or disadvantage points in regards with human development and how IAI Work Plan II.

Cambodia already issued a national Development Plan. This Development Plan were hopefully could help Cambodia to improve their development. IAI Work Plan II proposed project namely "Strengthening the Human Resource Capacity in the Field of Standards and Conformance for CLMV Countries. This proposed project could help Cambodia to enhance their life expectancy through food safe and quality control of agricultural products.

Laos issued National Five Year Development Plan. Since Laos had willingly to improve their development, the writer examined the expected outcome if Laos implement proposed project called "Training of Sustainable Ecotourism management". The writer expected that Laos could increase their standard of living and improve the quality of living and work. Means that this proposed project could help Laos to improves their Gross National Income.

Myanmar development was hampered by their low tolerance upon personal freedom. Despite of that, Myanmar was an important economic actor in ASEAN. Technology already started to advance. Even the utilization of mobile phone and

internet already grew. The proposed project called as "Short Term Training Course for officials in CLMV Countries to Enhance on Building E-Commerce Related Policies" was expected to improve their standard of living. It would help to improve Gross National Income for Myanmar.

Viet Nam was listed as the highest rank of CLMV in term of Human Development. Viet Nam was focused to improve their education quality, marked by its high rate of education national expenditure (2nd highest) compared to other sector. The proposed project called "Advancing Higher Education/University Governance and Management" could improve the education in Viet Nam. This proposed project helps to increase the capacity building of lecturer in higher education. Thus, it means to increase the quality of student and education index.

After the HDI of each CLMV improved, it could not abruptly increase the competitive within ASEAN. It was showed through how the HDI profile of each CLMV was increase at 2015, yet could not significantly improve their index of competitiveness. The programs proposed by IAI Work Plan II are relevant to the 12 pillars of GCI. Therefore, the IAI Work Plan II could improve the Human Development of CLMV and also could help to achieve the competitive market region pillar.

The writer found that ASEAN lack of its role to force the implementation of regional development plan within member state. ASEAN also lack report regarding

the development. ASEAN happened to be stiff regional organization that lack of implementation and report of its project –in this thesis focus is IAI Work Plan.
